
What brings us here today?

- In 2013, the West Virginia Center for Children's Justice (WVCCJ) created the Handle With Care (HWC) program. HWC fosters collaboration among various local agencies to help support students who may have experienced trauma.
- In 2018, WVCCJ partnered with Regional Educational Laboratories Appalachia (REL AP) and the West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE) to develop materials to support schools that implement HWC with data monitoring and data use for continuous improvement.
- This presentation provides an orientation to the materials available for monitoring Handle With Care data and to processes for facilitating decisions/next steps towards improving student outcomes.


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Overview of the Handle With Care Program

The problem

Students may experience trauma as a result of their exposure to events or incidents that occur at home or in the community, such as domestic violence, drug overdoses, and systemic issues like racial injustice or the COVID-19 pandemic.




Such students have increased risk for negative outcomes such as poor academic performance, emotional and behavior problems, dropping out of school, and delinquency.

How can HWC help?

HWC is a school-community partnership program founded in 2013 to provide students exposed to trauma in their homes, schools, or communities with appropriate supports to help them succeed.





A child is exposed to a traumatic event.

If law enforcement is called, they identify children at the scene, and find out where they go to school or daycare.



LAW ENFORCEMENT
A law enforcement officer will contact the designated school personnel and provide initial information through a Handle with Care notice. Only three words: "Handle with Care" are given. No other details are given.




SCHOOL DISTRICT
The designated school personnel will then ensure notification is provided to the child's teachers and support personnel.

Handle With Care Implementation in Schools

Implementing the HWC program in schools



A **school or district contact** receives the HWC notice from law enforcement and/or other first responders.



The school contact informs the appropriate **teachers and school staff** (e.g., school counselors, nurses) about the notice.



Teachers and school staff observe the **student** to determine whether the student needs additional support and offer appropriate trauma-sensitive support as needed.

Using HWC data to learn more about HWC in your school

- Districts and schools may want to **regularly monitor program data.**

Implementation Data



Information related to how teachers and other school staff carry out the HWC program.

Student Outcome Data



Information on student attendance, behavior, and academic achievement.


Information on student referrals to school counselors and external mental health providers.

Monitoring HWC data will help school leaders and teachers:

- Identify trends (if any) in data across different groups of students over time,
- Learn more about staff professional development needs related to supporting students experiencing trauma,
- Ensure supports are in place to help students succeed, and
- Plan for how to use resources to address pressing needs, such as additional staffing and professional development.

Data Sources for Monitoring Handle With Care Implementation

Sources for HWC data



Implementation data

Sources: HWC notices from first responders, school-level program data from school or district contact



Student outcome data

Sources: Student information systems and/or state longitudinal data-tracking systems



Student referral data

Sources: Teacher referrals of students to school counselors, school counselor referrals of students to external mental health providers



Monitoring data for groups of students



Cycle HWC Group

The subset of students identified for HWC support in a given cycle



Cumulative HWC Group

The subset of students identified for HWC support over the course of the school year



Schoolwide Group

ALL students in the school, including students identified for HWC support

The HWC school team

Comprised of five to seven members including school leaders, educators, and/or staff who are responsible for leading program implementation and data monitoring.

Role	Responsibilities
Data lead*	Prepares HWC implementation and student outcome data
Meeting facilitator*	Leads meetings and facilitates discussion alongside the data lead
Meeting notetaker*	Takes notes and outlines next steps for the team
Teacher liaison*	Collects data from colleagues who teach students identified for HWC support
School counselor*	Collects data on referrals of students identified for HWC support to school counselor and external mental health providers
Team member	Supports the school team during data review meetings; may serve as facilitator or notetaker if school team decides to rotate roles

*For the HWC school team to function effectively, this role needs to be filled.

HWC school team responsibilities



Set a schedule for monitoring



Monitor data



Collect teacher feedback



Review data

Monitoring Handle With Care Data

Understanding implementation

- Programs may fail to achieve intended outcomes because of:
 - Poor design,
 - Lack of adequate training and ongoing support,
 - Weak implementation or low dosage, or
 - Failure to plan.
- Examining implementation and student outcome data can:
 - Help identify factors that contribute to the success or failure of a program,
 - Allow for midcourse corrections, and
 - Ensure that students receive timely support.

HWC data review meetings

- HWC school teams meet regularly for data review meetings to discuss data and decide on next steps.
- During a data review meeting, the HWC school team:
 - Discusses HWC implementation and student outcome data for a given cycle,
 - Looks across cycles to compare data over time, and
 - Decides on next steps to improve program implementation and supports for students.





- Number of external mental health provider referrals for students identified for HWC support.

What is the HWC Data Lead Workbook?

Excel document that:

- Includes data entry and dashboard tabs
- Allows staff to capture data on:
 - HWC notices
 - Student outcome data (achievement, attendance, behavior)
 - Referrals to school counselors and external mental health providers

What is the purpose of the HWC Data Lead Workbook?

Supports staff to document and monitor HWC implementation and student outcome data. Dashboard tabs include tables and graphs to support HWC school teams with data interpretation.

Using the HWC School Counselor Workbook


- The HWC School Counselor Workbook includes the following tabs for viewing or inputting information:
 - Instructions
 - Header
 - Summary
 - Cycle tabs
- The HWC school counselor responsibilities include the following:
 - Add student referral information in the workbook
 - Share student referral data with the data lead to add to the HWC Data Lead Workbook
 - Review data in the “Header” and “Summary” tabs and prepare to share these data during the data review meeting with the HWC school team


Using the HWC Data Lead Workbook

 - Student Outcome Data Dashboard
- The HWC data lead responsibilities include the following:
 - Fill out data entry tabs in the HWC Data Lead Workbook with implementation and student outcome data
 - Review data in dashboard tabs and share these data during the data review meeting with the HWC school team

Supports school teams to monitor program implementation and student outcome data (attendance, behavior, and academic achievement).

The Five-Step Improvement Process




Protocols for discussion

Discussion Guide for Teachers (Appendix B)



- Uses systematic approach for gathering teacher input about implementing HWC
- Informs discussion at HWC school team meetings

Data Review Meeting Discussion Guide (Appendix I)




- Uses systematic approach for examining HWC data and student outcome data
- Informs how teams review, reflect, and plan
- Requires staff assigned to three key roles: facilitator, notetaker, and data lead

Preparing for a Handle With Care Data Review Meeting

Preparing for the HWC data review meeting: HWC data lead

The HWC data lead will:

- Input program and student outcome data, including referrals to counseling and external mental health providers, into the HWC Data Lead Workbook throughout a cycle.
- Share the data with the HWC school team facilitator ahead of the data review meeting.
- Review data for the current cycle during the data review meeting, using graphs for ease of understanding, and review longitudinal trends.




Preparing for the HWC data review meeting: School counselor(s)

Each school counselor will:

- Maintain an individual HWC School Counselor Workbook during the school year.
 - School counselors may choose to use a paper version of the HWC School Counselor Workbook.
- Input referral data into the HWC School Counselor Workbook throughout a cycle and share those data with the HWC data lead.

The HWC school team school counselor will:

- Review data for the current cycle and prior cycle(s), noting any trends for discussion.



Preparing for the HWC data review meeting: Facilitator

The HWC school team facilitator will:


- ❑ Review the HWC School Team Data Review Meeting Discussion Guide (appendix I) to prepare to lead the discussion.
- ❑ Set an agenda for the meeting that includes reports from each of the HWC school team members who have collected data in the last cycle.
- ❑ Lead the data review meeting, relying on the data review meeting protocol (appendix I) as appropriate.
- ❑ Coordinate with the data lead to review data ahead of the whole-team meeting.



Preparing for the HWC data review meeting: Teacher liaison

The teacher liaison will:

- Collect information from teachers of students identified for HWC support in the most recent cycle using the Discussion Guide for Teachers (appendix B).
- Share findings during the data review meeting.



Preparing for the HWC data review meeting: Other team members

Other HWC school team members will:

- Support students identified for HWC support.
- Document any issues or challenges that arise in the HWC notification process.
- Share their own and other educators' experiences with students identified for HWC support.
- Review data or materials shared in advance of meetings.



Conducting the data review meeting


1. HWC school team members report on data.
2. HWC school team facilitator walks HWC school team members through the Data Review Meeting Discussion Guide (appendix I).
3. HWC school team members identify priorities and discuss and decide on next steps.



Getting Started

How to begin preparing for implementation

- Start working through the five-step process.
- Lay the foundation for program implementation and monitoring.
- Use HWC materials to inform efforts and answer questions.



Step 1: Conduct program training and prepare documentation

- Conduct training.
 - Put a protocol in place to inform school staff of HWC notices.
 - Designate a school contact to receive HWC notices.
- Prepare documentation.
 - Put memoranda of understanding (MOUs) in place with local participating organizations, as appropriate.
 - Create referral forms for teachers to use to send students to school counselors.
 - Gather information about external mental health providers to whom counselors can refer students.
 - Create parental consent forms for referring students to external mental health providers.



Step 2: Assign team roles and create a data review schedule

- Assign HWC school team roles.
- Create and commit to a data review schedule.
 - Set the regular schedule (the cycle) for the year.
 - Schedule internal data review team meetings for the first week after each cycle ends.

Tips for success


- Create form and structure for your project.

- Accept uncertainty and the need for adaptations over time.




